Public Asked to Help Improve the I-471 Corridor

Cincinnati, OH -- The I-471 Corridor Study will host its first public meeting on Thursday, October 26 from 4:00 to 7:00 p.m. at Highland Heights City Building, 175 Johns Hill Road in Highland Heights, Kentucky. The open house style meeting will provide the community with an opportunity to help develop the transportation goals and objectives for the I-471 Corridor.

"The growth in travel demand over the past 25 years has meant that the I-471 Corridor has issues of safety and mobility," said Campbell County Judge Executive Steve Pendery, Chair of the I-471 Project Management Team. "We hope to create a plan that enhances the quality of life and economic potential for this critical corridor."

The Ohio-Kentucky-Indiana Regional Council of Governments (OKI) will work with community leaders, organizations and the general public to gain an understanding of the land use/transportation dynamic for overall traffic improvement in the corridor.

The study consists of the nine mile long corridor which includes I-471, US 27, I-275, KY 8, and KY 9. The area accommodates close to a million vehicles a day making it one of the region's major transportation corridors.
